

Jason Reynolds and Ibram X. Kendi

- Jason Reynolds is an award-winning writer. His books include Long Way Down, the Track series, Look Both Ways, and many more.
- Ibram X. Kendi is a writer and professor. He is the director of the Center for Antiracist Research at Boston University.
- Reynolds took Kendi's book Stamped from the Beginning and remixed it for young adults.




Jason Reynolds and Ibram X. Kendi Stamped: Racism, Antiracism, and You

- Jason Reynolds decided to create a "remix" of Ibram X. Kendi's book, Stamped from the Beginning. The book has been added at many schools, and it has been challenged and banned in some places.
- Reynolds speaks directly to young people in the book. He also reads his own work in the audiobook version—a great listening experience.

Jason Reynolds and Ibram X. Kendi appeared on The Daily Show with Trevor Noah to promote their book.


Interview with Reynolds and Kendi



Just Mercy: A True Story of the Fight for Justice (Adapted for YA) by Bryan Stevenson

- Bryan Stevenson is a lawyer who started the Equal Justice Initiative.
- His book was adapted for younger readers. This is the second book on the summer reading list for students going into 7th and 8th grades next year.
- The book has been made into an excellent movie.

Bryan Stevenson, Attorney and Author

Attorney Bryan Stevenson founded and is the director of the Equal Justice Initiative, a human rights organization in Alabama.

Mr. Stevenson and EJI staff have represented hundreds of people. EJI has won dozens of cases. They have won cases that ban excessive imprisonment and unfair sentencing, have exonerated 135 wrongfully condemned people on Death Row, and have exonerated hundreds of wrongly convicted people.


A 2012 case EJI brought to the Supreme Court has successfully banned mandatory life sentences for children 17 or younger.

- Stevenson's memoir tells the story of how EJI came about.
- It focuses on the powerful story of Walter MacMillan, who was wrongly accused of murder and sentenced to Death Row.
- Stevenson talks about that case as an example of an unjust system that exists not only in Alabama but around the country.


- This is one of the choices for incoming 7th graders.
